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THE OTHER SIDE OF SUFFERING

MESSAGE FROM PASTOR



Psalm 119:67 & 71
⁶⁷Before I was afflicted I went astray, but now I keep your word. ⁷¹It is good for me that I was afflicted, that I might learn your statutes.

Suffering is distressing. It often causes physical, mental, emotional, and spiritual trauma. Suffering disrupts our

lives in unexpected ways and has the potential of knocking us completely off our feet. It is no wonder we do our best to avoid it. We pray desperately for God to protect us from any suffering, and we strive to avoid any actions we think might result in our suffering. Yet when we study our Bibles, we discover that suffering can and often does have a beneficial aspect.

Listen to the psalmist David as he celebrates the

fact that he had suffered affliction. He honestly concedes that prior to being afflicted he had a tendency to wander away from God (verse 67). Like all of us, he allowed himself to be distracted by the siren calls of worldly living and temptations. By so doing, he exposed himself to the possibility of being trapped and exploited by the deceptive pleasures of sin. God's antidote for this kind of dangerous gullibility is to ensure that our wanderings are met with discomfort and suffering. God is not trying to be mean - He is restraining us from becoming too deeply entangled in the slow death spiral that is the ultimate result of sin. Once we recognize that the path of sin leads to suffering and loss, we are more likely to resist the sugar-coated temptations that assault us. So, one benefit of suffering is that it curbs our taste for sin.

A second benefit of suffering is that it helps us to learn and understand God's statutes or ways (verse 71). As sufferings force us to our knees and ultimately to God's Word, we discover that our

sufferings are neither arbitrary nor malevolent. God's Word explains that afflictions are designed to strengthen us and keep us close to Him. When we understand that this is how God works, we do not torment ourselves with desperate questions about "why us?" and/or charge God with impotence or unkindness. We assuage our souls by internalizing the clear truths of Scripture. We are able to see a benevolent God at work using suffering for our good.

While none of us like suffering, we need to train ourselves to look on the other side of suffering. If we are in season of hurt and pain right now, what may God be trying to teach us? Is He calling us back from our wanderings? Or is He seeking to draw us into a deeper understanding of Himself? May God help us to use suffering as an opportunity to draw closer to Him no matter where we might be in our Christian walk.
