

## FEAR THE LORD

## MESSAGE FROM PASTOR



Deuteronomy 10:12-13 "And now, Israel, what does the Lord your God require of you, but to fear the Lord your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and to keep the commandments and statutes of the Lord, which I am commanding you today for your good?

While recounting Israel's history as he prepares them to enter the Promised Land without him, Moses uses one of their most painful experiences to explain how and why they should fear the Lord. Shortly after rescuing them from Egypt, God called Moses up to Mount Sinai to establish a formal covenant with the Israelites. While Moses was on the mountain for forty days receiving the details of the covenant, the Israelites made golden calves and began worshiping them. Their foolish rebellion brought swift retribution, and they were only saved from total extermination by Moses' intercession to

God on their behalf. Invoking the memory of that horrible incident Moses reminds them that all God wants is for them to fear Him. He points out that fearing the Lord involved the following three components:

1. To fear the Lord means to walk in His ways. To live in obedience to His revealed expectations and guidelines. God is the Creator of the universe and Deliverer of His people. He is the God of gods, and Lord of lords (verse 17). Even a minute apprehension of His position and authority obligates us to obey Him.

2. To fear the Lord means to love Him. Our obedience to Him must not be petulant or grudging. We must nurture a deep and genuine affection for Him as we acknowledge His character and His care for us. Because God first loved us, we should love Him too (verse 15).

3. To Fear the Lord means to serve Him with all our heart and our soul. We must be completely and truly devoted to Him. We must live our lives for His purpose and His glory. He must be the center and circumference of our lives. As we navigate life, we must make pleasing God the ultimate motive of our existence and activities.

Having told us how to fear the Lord, Moses informs us why we should fear the Lord. It is for our good (verse 13)! Fearing God is not an exploitative experience. In fact, it is the best way to enjoy life as God intended. We grow in our intimacy with Him as our surrendered hearts discover how sweet He is. We overcome worry as we depend on Him to care for us. When we fear the Lord, we inhabit the space that is under His constant attention and care. As Psalm 33:18-19 reminds us; "Behold, the eye of the Lord is on those who fear him, on those who hope in his steadfast love, 19 that he may deliver their soul from death and keep them alive in famine."

No matter the exigencies or challenges of life, those who fear the Lord will enjoy His protection and provision. In light of all this, why wouldn't we fear the Lord?
