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THE KINDNESS AND SEVERITY OF GOD

MESSAGE FROM PASTOR



Romans 11:22 Note then the kindness and the severity of God: severity toward those who have fallen, but God's kindness to you, provided you continue in his kindness. Otherwise you too will be cut off.

In a single breath, the Scriptures call us to pay attention to two attributes of God that

sound contradictory, but actually work perfectly in harmony as God deals with us. In fact, it is essential to simultaneously keep these two characteristics in view in order to live how God desires us to.

As Paul discusses the relationship between the Jewish nation and the church (made up of both Jews and Gentiles), he reminds Gentile Christians that they must have the proper attitude towards God and themselves in order not to displease God through presumption or pride. Israel, God's chosen people, presumptuously persisted in sin and rebellion to the point where they experienced God's severity as He set them aside (temporarily) to call together the church – a body of people from all nations united by their faith in Jesus Christ. The idea that we Gentiles who once were not a people have now become God's people is heady stuff. We can begin to think that we are better than the Jews. We can become so cocky that we embark upon the same path that led to the discipline being experienced by the Jewish nation (Romans 11:17-20). Paul would spare us this error.

Therefore, he urges us to note the kindness and severity of God. "Note" calls us to pay close attention. We must keep both realities in the forefront of our minds and hearts. We must be aware that God will judge us if we engage in presumptuous sin but will sustain us if we strive to remain faith-

ful to Him. He shows amazing kindness to those who are committed to living for Him, even though we often fail and slip up. If we are devoted to Him in our hearts, He will sustain us by His kindness despite our inconsistencies and failures. But if we rebel and defect, we will reap the severe consequences of our actions.

May God help us to remain acutely aware of His kindness and severity so we walk with Him the way we should. May we fear His severity so much that we develop a healthy disgust for sin. And may we understand His kindness so much that we confidently continue to do our best to live for Him.
